A 45-year-old, married, father of two school going children, employed as a technical officer at a higher education institution, presented to the medical ward around 2 A.M, with the complaint of restlessness, trembling of hands and body, frightening experiences, unusual perspiration and mild degree of fever since previous evening. He was accompanied by his wife, who revealed that her husband has made a promise and stopped taking his usual drink for the past two days.

She told her mother that her classmates were jealous about her and plotting against her. The parents brought her to the emergency ward since she was refusing her food intake and self-care.
